Note from the Pastor



HAPPY NEW YEAR 2011

The question is, will it be happy? Blessed Epiphany; great feast of the Manifestation. The question is, will we see? Will we get it?

And of this much I am sure, that the one will depend upon the other. We will be happy only insofar as we get it, as we see. My concern is that we have for some time now been a people walking in darkness. My hope is that someone will light a match.

Two-thousand eleven. We are already one decade into the new millennium. In 1999, we were a people bathed in light. We were all future. The economy was exploding and the greatest concern we had as a nation and as a world was the problem of the so-called Y2K. Would our personal computers recognize the year 2000? Well, they had no problem, we did. All throughout 1999 I, along with our Holy Father Pope John Paul II, preached Jubilee. "Proclaim Jubilee," was my battle cry all year long. Jubilee is the great biblical teaching that all things begin again. All debt is forgiven, all land is returned, the poor are able to glean from the fields all year long for free. Jesus' first sermon was to proclaim Jubilee: Liberty to captives, release of prisoners, good news preached to the poor, a year of favor for the Lord. Now this is great stuff. It is all future, all hope.

And then it happened. The new millennium came. The world had experienced 2,000 years of Christianity, of Jesus' teaching. We were supposed to be ready for the next stage in our development as a people, as a church. We were no longer adolescents (16th century) when we fought with our brothers and sisters over who was the best and who was the rightist and who was the smartest and who had the truth. No, now we were 20. Young enough to be flexible and dynamic, old enough to begin to be mature and understand what these teachings of Jesus were truly all about. And then the light went out. And we were, and are left in the dark.

First the new economy (the one that was supposed to only go upward) collapsed. The ripple effect not only touched those who lost money in the market, but devastated those in the third world, in the global economy. And the poor peoples of mother earth are presently suffering as they have not for centuries. Then the catastrophic occurred.

The world's richest, most powerful, independent and selfsufficient country ever to have existed was brought to its knees by religious fanatics yielding box cutters. And the twin symbols of invincibility came crashing down with death and destruction everywhere. The nation and the world was in shock. For a time, all too short a time, we were in what

theologians call liminal space. That is a space where all our defenses are torn down and the masks of being in control are utterly devastated and we discover that which separates us (race, gender, ethnicity, religion, economics) no longer had power over us. For all too brief a time this nation was one. In our vulnerability, in our devastation, in our pain, and in our grief we all transcended that which kept us apart from one another. There were neither liberals nor conservatives, Catholics nor Protestants; only a people who shared the common suffering of being out of control, unable to fix, and even unable to explain what had just occurred. Now, as terrible as all of this is, it did afford us a window of opportunity to transcend and be transformed. All of a sudden, all of the things that seemed so very important to us as we climbed the ladder of success, were unimportant. All of a sudden the things that so preoccupied us seemed so petty. Everything was put in a cosmic perspective. The Window to God was open for a while. And then it was closed. And now it seems to be sealed. Shut. Tight.

There is a saying that love makes the world go round. Oh, would that were true. I am afraid that in our modern world it is hate that makes the world go round. Love is just way too hard and takes way too long. Hate and its underlying emotion fear is so much more efficient and works much quicker. If you want to move anyone or even society at a very fast pace make them afraid, very afraid. And we are not afraid, we are petrified. We see terror on all sides. We Now, the reason fear works so are on orange alert. quickly and so well is that it speaks to our very basic instinct for survival. If we are afraid that we will be attacked at any moment by weapons of mass destruction and by evil empires and by people who are bad, well, then it only makes sense to have a pre-emptive strike, to strike first, to kill the killers. And if we are vigilant enough and work hard enough we will be able to kill them all and end terror once and for all.

Jesus exposed that as a lie.

Jesus has replaced the twin towers of greed and violence, which leads to all wars and the collapse of all cultures with the twin teachings of love and forgiveness. And Jesus' teachings are not for the faint of heart. In most ways they are more difficult than the ways of the world. There were only two things that Jesus consistently preached against: greed and violence. And the one will always lead to the other. Greed says there is not enough for me and for thee and, therefore, I had better protect my way, my life style, against your desire to take it and destroy it. Now that makes perfect logical sense. But it will also lead us into being the most greedy and violent nation in the world. It is the law of unintended consequences.

Note from the Pastor (cont.)

Love is so hard. So darn inefficient. It takes so long. It requires so much. And it is impossible to teach. It can only be modeled. Fear is immediate, fast and easy to understand. Love requires story and patience and vulnerability and most of all it requires the precursor of forgiveness. The greatest act of love is to lay down one's life and the ultimate words to be spoken are the ones that come from the cross, "Father forgive them (all of them), they know not what they do."

Now I can hear some of you thinking (and at many times, myself included), "Yah, Father, that's nice churchy, theological talk. But this is the real world." Is it? Is this the real world or is this the illusion that we have chosen to embrace. The illusion of control, the illusion that we are the center of the universe, the illusion of sin. If, indeed, God is the ultimate reality, and that God is love then the really real is love. And Jesus was the ultimate realist.

This is the year 2011. This is the day of the Epiphany, God's manifestation to us. It is also the day when we traditionally make New Year's resolutions. I would like to propose one for us all, "Get real." There is no such thing as cheap grace. And while love is the ultimate reality, it takes great work. But it is not the work of control, it is the work of surrender, of letting go, of trusting, of forgiving. In the year 1999, we were all future, all hope. And we still are.

There is no future without forgiveness and forgiveness will always open up the door to that ultimate reality, love.

Happy New Year. Blessed Manifestation. May we all see it. May we all get it. May we get real.



Year of the Eucharist



Diocese of Joliet Official Biography for



Patron Saint of the Year of the Eucharist January:

Saint John Neumann (1811 - 1860)

In the Church of Saint James in Baltimore, Maryland, Father John Neumann became the first priest to make his religious profession as a Redemptorist in the New World. Before his elevation to bishop of Philadelphia at the age of 41, he had served as rector of Saint Philomena in Pittsburgh and Saint Alphonsus in Baltimore, as well as vice-provincial of the missionary order in America.

Neumann had many accomplishments throughout his life, including administering the largest diocese in the country and building new churches, one almost every month. He had a fond love for children and was the first to organize a Catholic diocesan school system, increasing the number of Catholic schools in his diocese from two to one hundred. He founded a new religious community, the Sisters of The Third Order of Saint Francis of Philadelphia, and he saved the Oblate Sisters of Providence from dissolution. He also introduced the Forty Hours Eucharistic Devotion to the United States.

Father Neumann was a priest of extraordinary spirituality, intense devotion to the Eucharist and selfless commitment to the service of all people. He was elected bishop by Pope Pius IX in 1852, and after his ordination, and because of his short stature, many called him with the greatest affection, "Our Little Bishop."

His feast day is January 5.
