

Note from the Pastor



There is a physical law that says for every action, there is a reaction. There is a spiritual corollary to this law that says for every uncontrollable action we encounter there is an automatic emotional-spiritual reaction. This was first pointed by the

Buddha who was most concerned with human pain and suffering. He taught that we can not avoid pain and suffering in this world but we can do something about how we react to it. And that "something" is to take note of our reactions. How do you react whenever trouble, conflict, pain or suffering come your way?

The Buddha goes on to point out that there are basically four different reactions to negative stimuli. Each of us has one major default reaction according to how we are neurologically and socially wired. Some of us will fret, others will get angry, some will slip into self-blame while still others will try to fill the void with anything they can put into their bodies.

Some of us are born worriers. Everything makes us anxious. The reality is that 90% of the things we worry and fret over never come about. That doesn't slow us down. Our automatic reaction to any situation is to worry and when we feed our worry, it grows. Last week's "Pickles" cartoon had the old grandpa telling his grandson, "Let's not bother grandma right now, Nelson, she's busy worrying." "How come?" "Well, she's convinced that the things she worries about most never happen. She feels it's up to her to keep worrying about them to make sure they never do happen. It's a lot of responsibility. Who knows what kind of chaos would break loose if she were to stop worrying? Back in 2000, she worried the Y2K bug into oblivion. Now she's working on preventing the end of world in 2012." Nelson responds, "Good job, Grandma."

For some of us our default mechanism is to get angry. Anger comes from the realization that, "It's just not fair. It's not right." Lesson number one: Where is it written that life is supposed to be fair? No matter. Whatever the situation, my blood begins to boil and the more I concentrate on how unfair this situation is, how my rights have been violated, how dare you cut me off in traffic, the angrier I become. And the more righteous I feel. And the more prone to a stroke and heart attack I am. Now, that's unfair. Boy, that makes me angry.

The least common reaction of the four is the third, self blame. Self blame has a little sister named self pity. I must have done something wrong. Oh, woe is me. I am never going to get out of this depression no matter how hard I try. And so, I emotionally shut down. I crawl into my hole and pray that it goes away. My reaction is inaction. And it doesn't get better, it gets worse.

The fourth default is the reaction of the addict. The addict is one who takes in more and more of what helps less and less, until you are completely consumed by your addiction. Life is tough? Have a drink. Maybe two. Ah, that's better. At least for today. Tomorrow it'll take three drinks. Did your boyfriend break with you? A quart of Haagen Dazs will help. Then you will really hate yourself. What do you do? Put a pizza in the oven. What do you use to take away the pain? Food, drink, sex, work? Is this your default mechanism?

All of us have one major reaction. Which one is yours? Now, you are not not going to react. We are wired to react in one of these ways. We can not suppress our immediate reaction. Then what can you do? Recognize that you are reacting. Take note of the fact that you are becoming very, very anxious or that you are extremely angry. Watch yourself drink that martini or surf the internet. Check out yourself loathing.

Now that you've noticed it, what are you going to do about it? There are two schools of thought. One says that just taking note of it, becoming aware of your reactions, will help you not to act so unconsciously in the future. The other school says that you can do something about it. There is an old American Indian story of the grandfather who was teaching his grandson about the two wolves that lived inside of him. "My child, one of the wolves is hate filled and judgmental and ready to destroy anything that gets in its way, it is vicious. The other wolf is nurturing and loving and caring for its pack. And these two wolves are at war." "Which one will win, Grandpa?" "The one, my beloved child, I choose to feed."

So, which is your default mechanism? The next time it kicks in, check it out. Name it, watch it, talk to it. But by all means, don't feed it. Don't feed the animal. That only encourages it to grow.

Diocese of Joliet Official Biography for

Patron Saint of the Year of the Eucharist **May:**

> Blessed Jacinta and Francisco Marto

In 1917 the Virgin Mary appeared to three young children shepherding their sheep in Fatima, Portugal; Jacinta and Francisco Marto and Lucia Dos Santos. Jacinta was seven years old and Francisco was nine, and their cousin Lucia was ten when the apparitions began. The children were normal Portuguese children who loved dancing and song. Their lives were simple, but hard by today's standard. The apparitions in Fatima would not only change the course of these simple children's lives, but also have a profound affect on the Church, and all the faithful. The Virgin at Fatima would bring a warning for the world and a plan to defeat the flow of evil and the erosion of faith.

Jacinta grew daily in her devotion to the Immaculate Heart by heroically making sacrifices for poor sinners. Francisco grew fervent in his devotion to the Eucharist. It is said he would spend most of his days in adoration, and contemplation. Both children were told by the Virgin Mary that she would soon take them to heaven. Francisco died within two years of the apparition of Influenza, and Jacinta died within three years. On February 20, 1920, Jacinta asked the hospital chaplain who heard her confession to bring her Holy Communion and give her the Anointing of the Sick because she was going to die "this very night". He told her that her condition was not that serious, and that he would return the next day. A few hours later Jacinta was dead. She had died, as she had often said she would, alone: not even a nurse was with her. Her body was found incorruptible when exhumed for the beatification.
