Note from the Pastor



It was a Sunday morning ritual. From 1976 to 1982 (the years I pastored at Sacred Heart Mission in Hopkins Park) it almost never varied. Up before dawn, morning prayer, quiet time, get into one of the 16

broken down vehicles we had throughout those six years and drive to Momence. The first stop was the pallet factory to pick up wood scraps for the rectory's wood burner. Then off to St. Patrick church in Momence for the 7:00 a.m. Mass, and after the Mass the drive back to Hopkins Park to prepare for the 10:00 a.m. Sunday morning Liturgy. On the way back on the Black Top (it was called the Black Top because it was the only paved road in the township) you had to pass through what was called The Front. The Front was a strip of road about a half mile from my church on which were located three bars. And even at that early hour they were doing a brisk business. As I drove by I would be greeted with smiles and waves by the patrons. I'd wave back and say, "Whatcha up to?" And the response was invariably the same. As they held up their can of Pabst Blue Ribbon they would wave at me and proclaim, "Preacher, we're having church!" And, indeed they were.

Church in the African-American community is culturally quite different from the church we experience today in the suburbs. It is closer to the old ethnic churches of Chicago where one's entire life: religious, cultural and even economic revolved around the Parish. In those days, one never asked what street you lived on but what Parish you belonged to. It was the same way at Sacred Heart in Hopkins Park and all of the thirtysome churches that dotted Pembroke Township. One didn't only worship at church, but socialized there, ate there, learned there and, most of all, enjoyed there.

"Preacher, we're having church!" Those are loaded words. In the black community from slavery days up to the present, the local African-American church was the one place you could be yourself. It was the one place where you were not beholden to "the man." You could relax, sing, shout and most of all, be who you were in God, yourself. Church is fun. "Preacher, we're having church"

Now, you all know that I am a stickler for starting Mass on time. Starting on time and ending on time shows respect for the people who are there. I have pastored Hispanic communities, Filipino communities and African-American communities (not to mention the Elmhurst community) none of which are famous for being on time. In the Mexican culture if you have an appointment at 7:00 p.m., expect it to happen at 7:30 (maybe). If by 7:45 they are not there, you have been dejar plantado, left planted. They are not going to show. But when it comes to the Sacred Liturgy, I do not tolerate this kind of behavior in the Latino Community. The 11:30 a.m. Spanish Mass at St. Isidore began exactly at 11:30 (and the church was filled). My rationale? Cuando se anda en gringolandia... when you live in the land of the gringos, you show up and start on time. The 1:00 p.m. Mass at St. Isidore was mostly Filipino and the same rules applied (with a little luck they were there by 1:15).

The only cultural community I would wait for was the black community. Our 10:00 Mass usually started about 10:15. Why the double standard? While both the Filipino and Mexican communities were oppressed, they were never slaves. A very wise old black man once explained it to me. He said, "Father, in the days we were slaves, we were first owned by and then worked for the white man. And everything we did was on his time. The only place we were not on his time was in church. That was God's time. God's time is different from man's time because with God, there is no time. And so if we're a few minutes late, it was no big deal, because we weren't going anywhere. We could stay the whole day long. The white man will give you an hour, but not an hour and one minute. We'll give God all day long. It's because it's the one place we can be who we really are... God's precious children." I can't argue with that.

Two weeks ago our high school group, Destiny, came down for a weekend of work and worship to Sacred Heart Mission in Hopkins Park. As Kathleen Gusloff told me, "it was a great weekend." When I asked her what was the best part, she told me the kids just loved the Mass we celebrated together. It was alive, everybody sang, the music was fun. They really felt like they were in communion not only with God but with each other. They clapped and shouted and sang and laughed and worshiped and had a really good time. "Preacher, we're having church!" For them it was a real eye opener. For me, it was really exciting to see their eyes opened. There are no better teachers of the ways of Jesus than God's precious poor.

Note from the Pastor (cont.)

During the Mass we had some testimony. One of the people shared about losing her young daughter to leukemia, another about her son being murdered and a third about her child dying of a drug overdose. Hard stories all. But what amazed the children (and never ceases to amaze me) was that in the midst of this incredible, unspeakable pain they were deeply aware of the presence of the Divine and loving God holding them up and getting them through. As the old spiritual goes, "We've come this far by faith, leaning on the Lord. Trusting in His holy Word, He's never failed us yet." Those are not just the words of a song, but the model for their life. And our young people caught it.

It is clear that faith is not taught, it's caught. It is caught by those who live it daily and model how it is lived. And our beautiful young people were infected by the faith of those who shared it with them. It was a marvelous night. So much so that our teens want to try to do it here. We'll see. This Wednesday our Religious Education program begins again. We will be teaching our children about Jesus but more importantly, we will endeavor to introduce them to Jesus. Today (Sunday) Destiny meets to discuss what they experienced on their mission trip two weeks ago. They will be sharing as to how to bring that experience home here to Elmhurst. And tonight the Wings to Heaven group meets in Barrett Hall at 6:00 p.m. May they be on time.

Why Does the Church Teach About Issues Affecting Public Policy?

The Church's obligation to participate in shaping the moral character of society is a requirement of our faith, a part of the mission given to us by Jesus Christ. Faith helps us see more clearly the truth about human life and dignity that we also understand through human reason. As people of both faith and reason, Catholics are called to bring truth to political life and to practice Christ's commandment to "love one another" (Jn 13:34). According to Pope Benedict XVI, "charity must animate the entire lives of the lay faithful and therefore also their political activity, lived as 'social charity'" (Encyclical Deus Caritas Est, no. 29).

The United States Constitution protects the right of individual believers and religious bodies to participate and speak out without government interference, favoritism, or discrimination. Civil law should recognize and protect the Church's right and responsibility to participate in society without abandoning our central moral convictions. Our nation's tradition of pluralism is enhanced, not threatened, when religious groups and people of faith bring their convictions into public life. The Catholic community brings to the political dialogue a consistent moral framework and broad experience serving those in need.
