Note from the Pastor



I really like the month of September. The children are back in school, the evenings are cooling off and it is a good time to reminisce and remember. "Try to remember that time in September." With Jim Japczyk

announcing our first ever 5K run/walk today, I am remembering the September of my 60th year. It was the first (and last) time I participated in the full Chicago Triathlon. From the time I was in my 20's I had always wanted to do one but the times and the circumstances were never right. While I don't have a bucket list (oh, I would like to take my family to Spain someday to show my son where his orgullo comes from), I did want to do this. And so I did.

Just like our own 5K run/walk, my parish, St. Isidore used the occasion as a fundraiser. We will be using the funds from our own event for our little sister school, Holy Family in Bensenville/Addison. What was raised was to be used for scholarship money and because there were three of us from the parish who were participating in it, Fr. Felipe Leggareta (now the pastor of St. John in Villa Park), Andrea Gallo, our youth minister, and myself, we called it the Trinity Triathlon. Of course, there were t-shirts with all of the sponsors and on the back of them was written, "I told my pastor to jump in the lake... and I paid for it." And so did the pastor.

To generate excitement (and sponsors) for the event, at our annual parish picnic Butch cut off what was left of the hair on my head. Bald may be beautiful but I looked like a bowling ball with eyes. I began training almost a year before. Bicycling would be no problem (or so I thought). The only difficulty was trying to keep balance on the \$2,000 bike that one of the elite athletes in my parish loaned me for the race. Skinny tires are really skinny and handle bars that went forward into the next county were not easy to negotiate. Every morning at 5:00, I would circle the parking lot of Stratford Square in Bloomingdale enough times until my legs turned in to butter.

Running was my joy. Oh, how I loved to run. I'm not fast, but once you've run long enough to get into the zone, you enter into another world and a sweet world it is. Swimming, I was sure, would be easy. I'm a Pisces and I think I learned to swim before I learned to walk. As a little boy my father took me out in a boat and threw me overboard to swim to shore. Swimming to shore was the easy part. (The hard part was getting out of the bag with the rocks in it.) Also difficult was learning how to get in and out of a wet suit in order to endure the cold waters of Lake Michigan. It truly is the longest (and coldest) mile.

Race day was a parish event. Several hundred parishioners showed up to cheer us on and to celebrate an outdoor Mass on the museum campus while we were racing. Before that, they all gathered to watch us plunge into the chilly waters of the Lake and encourage us as we began. When it was my turn to jump in with our group of 150-200 triathletes of all ages we were instructed to enter the lake and tread water until it was time to start. And so we did. Did you ever see Asian carp bobbing up and down on top of each other jockeying for position? That's the picture. When the gun went off the first thing I felt was somebody pulling my leg under the lake. Then another 20 year old was on top of me as he used my bald head to catapult himself ahead. I swallowed some water and began to panic. My heart began racing as I slowly made my way out of the mass of bodies. Unable to catch my breath I looked up and saw the good people of St. Isidore cheering me on. "Go, Father, Go!" they shouted and,"You look great down there." I shouted back but they couldn't hear me, "I think I'm dying down here." I was trying to shout the last words of Professor Backwards before he drowned, "Pleh, pleh." They just smiled and waved. This was not good. I was not going to make it. They were going to have to pull me out before I even began. I was cold, wet, prematurely tired and had to go to the bathroom (water, water everywhere). I finally made it around the first buoy about a quarter of a mile out. Once I rounded the buoy I was able to get into a swimmer's rhythm and the rest of the one mile swim was, believe it or not, pretty easy. Once I got out of the water I got cocky. I made it this far, what could possibly go wrong?

I was in absolutely no hurry to finish the race. My goal was only to finish so in the transitions where you change from swimming to biking, I ate my protein bars, chatted with my fellow athletes, and took my time. I mounted my bike and off I went to Lake Shore Drive. It was truly exhilarating and not a little frightening. You see, they only close down one lane of the Drive and in Note from the Pastor (cont.)

the other lane are cars whizzing by. To my surprise I began whizzing by those twenty-somethings who had pulled me down in the water. With a smirk on my face and Gatorade dripping from my mouth I was making great time. The 25 miles would be done before I knew it but not before I fell off my bike at the hairpin turn for the second lap. The bruise wasn't too bad I thought as I flew into the Mini Cooper and bounced off again to continue the ride. It was the day after that I discovered it was much worse than I imagined.

With the bike portion behind me there was now 6.2 miles of running to finish the race. Cake walk. Well, not quite. By now it was getting warm and the sun was shining and the sweat was pouring but that didn't slow me down from eating. Everything I could get my hands on. I swear I'm the only person in the history of the triathlon who ever gained weight while participating in it. By the last mile I was getting a little giddy and not too clear in the head. At different portions, I found parishioners cheering us on. And move on we did. By the last quarter mile I was shouting out to the crowd, "Thank you, thank you very much, I would like to thank my producers, members of the academy and all you little people who voted for me." I knew by now my body would make it, my head was somewhere else. Crossing the finish line I got some more Gatorade and a banana in my hand and gave up my ankle bracelet which showed that I was thirteenth in my 60-65 age group. Not bad, I thought, but I shouldn't have spent so much time eating in transition. All in all, it was a good day.

On Saturday, October 20 we at Mary Queen are planning on having a very good day as well. It is the day of our Mary Queen of Heaven 5K run/walk sponsored by the Mary Queen men's group. Do plan on joining us. I'm afraid that my running days are over (my knees finally said, "No") but walk (and talk) I will. Do plan on having the entire family to join us for a wonderful day.




CATHOLIC MINISTRIES ANNUAL APPEAL FOLLOW-UP MAILING AND PLEDGE REMINDERS

The Challenge of Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship

How Does the Church Help Catholics to Address Political and Social Questions?

A Well-Formed Conscience

The Church equips its members to address political questions by helping them develop well-formed consciences. "Conscience is a judgment of reason whereby the human person recognizes the moral quality of a concrete act... [Every person] is obliged to follow faithfully what he [or she] knows to be just and right" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1778). We Catholics have a lifelong obligation to form our consciences in accord with human reason, enlightened by the teaching of Christ as it comes to us through the Church.

The Virtue of Prudence

The Church also encourages Catholics to develop the virtue of prudence, which enables us "to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1806). Prudence shapes and informs our ability to deliberate over available alternatives, to determine what is most fitting to a specific context, and to act. Prudence must be accompanied by courage which calls us to act. As Catholics seek to advance the common good, we must carefully discern which public policies are morally sound. A good end does not justify an immoral means. At times Catholics may choose different ways to respond to social problems, but we cannot differ on our obligation to protect human life and dignity and help build through moral means a more just and peaceful world.

Doing Good and Avoiding Evil

There are some things we must never do, as individuals or as a society, because they are always incompatible with love of God and neighbor. These intrinsically evil acts must always be rejected and never supported. A preeminent example is the intentional taking of human life through abortion. It is always morally wrong to destroy innocent human beings. A legal system that allows the right to life to be violated on the grounds of choice is fundamentally flawed.

Similarly, direct threats to the dignity of human life such as euthanasia, human cloning, and destructive research on human embryos are also intrinsically evil and must be opposed. Other assaults on human life and dignity, such as genocide, torture, racism, and the targeting of noncombatants in acts of terror or war, can never be justified. Disrespect for any human life diminishes respect for all human life.

As Catholics we are not single-issue voters. A candidate's position on a single issue is not sufficient to guarantee a voter's support. Yet a candidate's position on a single issue that involves an intrinsic evil, such as support for legal abortion or the promotion of racism, may legitimately lead a voter to disqualify a candidate from receiving support.

Opposition to intrinsically evil acts also prompts us to recognize our positive duty to contribute to the common good and act in solidarity with those in need. Both opposing evil and doing good are essential. As Pope John Paul II said, "the fact that only the negative commandments oblige always and under all circumstances does not mean that in the moral life prohibitions are more important than the obligation to do good indicated by the positive commandment" (*Encyclical Veritatis Splendor*, no. 52). The basic right to life implies and is linked to other human rights to the goods that every person needs to live and thrive - including food, shelter, health care, education, and meaningful work. The use of the death penalty, hunger, lack of health care or housing, human trafficking, the human and moral costs of war, and unjust immigration policies are some of the serious moral issues that challenge our consciences and require us to act.

Making Moral Choices

Difficult political decisions require the exercise of a well-formed conscience aided by prudence. This exercise of conscience begins with always opposing policies that violate human life or weaken its protection. "Those who formulate law therefore have an obligation in conscience to work toward correcting morally defective laws, lest they be guilty of cooperating in evil and in sinning against the common good" (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops [USCCB], Catholics in Political Life).

When morally flawed laws already exist, prudential judgment is needed to determine how to do what is possible to restore justice - even if partially or gradually - without ever abandoning a moral commitment to full protection for all human life from conception to natural death (see Pope John Paul II, Encyclical Evangelium Vitae, no. 73).

Prudential judgment is also needed to determine the best way to promote the common good in areas such as housing, health care, and immigration. When Church leaders make judgments about how to apply Catholic teaching to specific policies, this may not carry the same binding authority as universal moral principles but cannot be dismissed as one political opinion among others. These moral applications should inform the consciences and guide the actions of Catholics.

RECOGNIZING A STROKE

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize a stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- S Ask the individual to SMILE
- T Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (Coherently)
- R Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS

If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call emergency number immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

New sign of a Stroke - Stick out your tongue. If the tongue is "crooked", if it goes to one side or the other, that is also and indication of a stroke.
