Note from the Pastor



Meet Hannah Thompson

In a world pre-occupied with celebrity, it is so nice to celebrate those the world may never know and yet make all the difference in the world. The older (and wiser?) I get the more I am convinced that progress in evolving our consciousness will not be accomplished by the connected and powerful but by the everyday people. We will move to a better place and space not by enormous programs instituted by powerful people and governments but by the smallest acts done in solidarity with those around us. And the more we identify with them, the more they and we are transformed. How do I know this? By watching and knowing Jesus.

St. Paul puts it this way: *Think of yourselves the way Christ Jesus thought of Himself. He had equal status with God but didn't think so much of Himself that He had to cling to the advantages of the status no matter what. Not at all. When the time came, He set aside the privileges of deity and took the status of a slave, became human! It was an incredibly humbling process. He didn't claim special privileges. Instead, He lived a selfless, obedient life and then died a selfless obedient death – and the worst kind of death at that: a crucifixion. Because of this God lifted Him high.* (Philippians 2:1 ff. Peterson)

The way of Jesus isn't the way of ostensible power and might but the way of the wound. By his wounds, the Scriptures tell us, we are healed. And the great truth in all of humanity is that we are all wounded, we are all in need of healing. Some of us wear our wounds on the outside; most of us have them hidden inside. These are the most difficult to heal because we don't want to acknowledge them. So they fester and cripple us inside.

Jesus wore His vulnerability, His woundability on the outside. Those of us with so called handicaps do so also. While the inner wounded would rather not look, the outer wounded have no choice and offer us all a pathway to the fullness of life. Our Down's syndrome young people show us what life looked like before the fall. In their joyful innocence, they call us all to the essentials in life... unconditional love and belonging. Our autistic young people call us into a world so very hard to enter into, yet when we have the grace and

courage to do so, we enter not only into a world unknown but mysteriously beautiful. By their wounds we are healed.

Today I write about one of our extraordinary parishioners, Hannah Thompson. To the outside world she looks handicapped. Yet, to Hannah, every physical obstacle has become a stepping stone in leading a full and powerful life. And as she embarks on her journey she invites us with our inner wounds to join her.

Hannah is a graduate of Elmhurst College with a B.A. in Communications. She is, via her voice computer, a lector here at Mary Queen and you can follow her blog, "Hannah's Adventures of Living her Dreams," at

Hannah is a motivational speaker and in her own words, "encouraging people to do the impossible. I was born with Cerebral Palsy and that does not stop me from doing anything! I am changing the world one audience at a time." Actually she is changing it one person at a time because you cannot be in Hannah's presence without being caught up in her enthusiasm for life.

It has been said that spirituality is all about what you do with your wounds. Either we will find a way to hand them over or surely we will pass them on. Either we give them to the Wounded One, Jesus or we continue to perpetuate our hurt until it turns to bitterness

and gall. Hannah has obviously learned to hand it over. There is no self-pity in her.

What follows in a short section of her blog. Read with delight and follow her dreams.

Friday, February 28, 2014

I rarely watch the news because it's always heartbreaking. It's always about violence, death, hatred, and all things negative. It's exhausting. So, what do we do about it?

This is not an easy question to answer. Some would say the government has to change, some would say schools, some would say the media, and the list goes on and on. In my humble opinion, it's us. It's us who has to change and focus on doing good. It doesn't have to be an enormous change, it's the small stuff. I'll put myself in the fire for a second. Oftentimes, I judge others on the way they dress. I've always excused this behavior with the fact that I dress nicely because of my disability. People will certainly see my wheelchair then the outfit. I always hope that the outfit speaks louder than the chair. Although this hopefully makes sense to most of you, and resonates with some of you, it is not an excuse to judge at all. I try to stop myself and it's hard for me. It's definitely a flaw. Needless to say, I will certainly work on that these next 40 days and beyond.

It's the small things. My brother will be going away to the University of Kentucky this fall and when I think about the advice I would give him, it would be to do the right thing when nobody is watching. It's so easy to do the right thing when people are watching. What we do behind closed doors translates into our character.

So, what small things can I do to make the news something people want to watch? A lot! We can do good. It's simple acts of kindness, it's refraining from judgment, it's all sorts of little, teeny, tiny things that will make our world a better place.

In this season of the Resurrection, we are invited to follow Hannah's lead. And she will lead us into the House of the Divine.

DECREE OF THE DIOCESAN BISHOP

There are two categories of the Christian faithful, who very much desire to receive Holy Communion during the celebration of Mass, but whose physical condition prohibits or makes it difficult for them to do so. One group includes those confined to home because of illness or disability. The other is those whose physical condition or other special circumstances makes it difficult or impossible for them to join in the Communion procession, although they are present in church.

The Church is concerned that these members of the faithful have access to the great sacrament of our Lord's Body and Blood, which offers such important spiritual benefits and which Christ taught is necessary for eternal life. At the same time, and precisely because of the importance of the sacrament, the Church is obligated to protect its sanctity and dignity.

Thus, to achieve these two ends and to provide more precise norms for the implementation Canon 230§3 and *Immensae caritatis*, Art. 8, and in accord with the duty of the diocesan bishop defined in Canon 838§4, after having consulted the Presbyteral Council, I hereby establish particular law for the Diocese of Joliet as follows:

1. *Those communicants in church who are unable to join in the Communion procession are to receive Holy Communion only from an ordinary or extraordinary minister.*
2. *Hosts intended for members of the faithful who are unable to be present for the celebration of Mass are to be placed in a pyx on the altar. Immediately before the final blessing, the pyx is to be presented by the celebrant or deacon to the minister who will take Holy Communion from the Church to the homebound; It is preferable that the pyx be placed inside a burse. The presentation may be in silence or with simple words such as, "With the love and prayers of this community, I entrust to you the sacred Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ for the spiritual nourishment of our brother(s) /sister(s) who cannot be with us today." The minister may then join in the procession or return to his/her seat and informally leave the church. The distribution of Holy Communion to the home(s) or other location must take place immediately. Hosts may not be retained by the minister for distribution at a later time.*

When Holy Communion is to be taken to homes, hospitals or nursing homes at a time apart from Mass, the minister is to take the necessary number of hosts from the tabernacle of the church in accord with the direction of the pastor, immediately before the intended distribution of Holy Communion. A pyx, placed inside a burse, must be used. Hosts may not be retained by the minister for distribution at a later time, but are to be returned to the tabernacle.

The minister of Holy Communion is to use the official rite from "The Pastoral Care of the Sick" when ministering Holy Communion outside of Mass.


This particular law of the Diocese of Joliet is effective on June 22, the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, in the Year of our Lord, 2014.
