

ADIOS, FAMILIA

I don't exit well. Usually on my way out I stumble over my own feet and even at times, step on my tongue. I'll try to do it a little better this time. Philosopher Jean Paul Sartre's most famous tome was called "No Exit." There's no way out.

as possible. Both for me and for you. When I was a little boy one of my most vivid memories was being at the old Italian wedding receptions with peanuts on the floor, Italian beef sandwiches in hand and lots of beer and pop. While the reception was fun, getting out of the place was shear drudgery. According to custom, my parents had to go to every person in the room to say their goodbye's. This took forever. Even at the age of seven I can remember thinking, "Come on. Let's get out of here. Just say good-bye and let's go." It was then that I discovered that the hardest thing for and American to say in 25 words or less is "good-bye." And yet we must. And so I shall.

I beg to differ. And I pray we can do it as gracefully

For all of the wonders of the Catholic priesthood, there are two difficult burdens that we are called to bear. One is being a public person. The priest belongs to his people, he truly does. And this gives him an entrée into their lives and their hearts rather easily and almost immediately. I'm always amazed at how quick we can get to the heart of the matter because of the implicit trust that a parishioner has with his/her priest. I am humbled by this but I am also exhausted by it. At any hour of the day or night, because I am a





public person, I am on call. It's the price you pay. And I pay it willingly.

The other difficulty is saying good-bye. It is not just the good-bye, but in the finality of the good-bye. I can think of no other lifestyle or job where you are told that you are to be the father of a community and to get to know that community intimately with all their sorrows and joys, their hopes and dreams. You are to participate in leading that community and shepherding it. You are to get as close to them as you possibly can to help them grow in who they can be in the Lord. And then, when the time to go comes, you have to go. Period. And you really can't come back. You can't come back because you have been replaced by a new father who now has to gain that same acceptance and legitimacy that you had. He can't do that if you are still constantly around. When you leave, you really have to leave.

And so I must. As most of you know, after spending some time traveling with my grandchildren and children this summer, I will be moving to Northern California to live at the New Camaldoli Hermitage in Big Sur (if Catholics know anything, they know real estate). Fr. Cyprian Consiglio, one of my former students, is the Prior (Abbott) there. I will be living the eremitic life along with the other monks for the foreseeable future. The eremitic (desert) life is basically one of a hermit living in your own isolated cell. In addition to praying (obviously) I will be doing some manual labor with the monks and have an opportunity for study and maybe some writing. My stay with the monks is open-ended. It will probably depend on how badly I miss my grandchildren.

Many have asked why I am doing this. It's very simple. In many religious traditions of the East it is believed there are four periods in life. The first is that of the student. The second is that of a householder. The householder runs his house and makes sure things run smoothly in all the things the head of the household is called to do. I've done this for 45 years. Once that is done, you are then called to become a forest dweller, or in my case a desert dweller. That's when you let go of all that has gone before you in order to figure out where you are going next. I truly don't know. I may come back into the ministry that I have done before; it may be something radically different. I don't know. That's why I'm going.

The fourth stage is that of the Sanyasi, the Senex, or wandering old wise fool. To that I can only think, "We'll see." But in the meantime I must let go of what has given me my identity, security, and work. And that's all of you.


I enter into what is called liminal space. Liminal space is the distance between first and second base or maybe in my case, between third base and home. You are neither here nor there. But it's a wonderful place for God to get hold of you. And so I must go. And you must let me go.

Of all the parishes I've been in my life, none has been better for a wizened old priest getting ready to move on than Mary Queen of Heaven. What an incredible parish this is. I cannot begin to thank you enough for your wonderful support and your willingness to grow. My greatest joy is to watch you grow in your own spiritual life and see that the great secrets that have been entrusted to me are now passed on to you. And somehow, by the grace of God, I've been a catalyst for that, a conduit of His great work of life. And so I say to you all, thank you, thank you!

Well, it has taken me more than 25 words to say, but I say it with great love, true admiration and a promise to remember you forever: Good-bye.


HOW DOES ONE SAY THANK-YOU?

Father's Day Collection for Infirmed & Retired Priests

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On Father's Day June 15, there will be special collection to care for our infirm and retired priests. The money raised from this collection will go to the fund which provides long term care for our priests who need assisted living or skilled nursing care. Currently the diocese cares for seven of our retired priests who need these services.

While we are blessed to ordain new young men to the priesthood year by year, we have many more priests approaching retirement age. As such, there is a need to strengthen the fund that will provide for their care should they not be able to care for themselves. This collection should not be confused with the collection for the *Retirement Fund* for *Religious*, which is taken in December and assists religious men and women who belong to religious orders. That collection does not benefit or provide care for our retired diocesan priests.

I humbly ask that you prayerfully consider making a donation to help our aged and sick priests as an expression of appreciation for all they have done to nourish your life of faith through their spiritual guidance and celebration of the sacraments.
