Note from the Pastor

Sept 29th – Feast of the Archangels Michael Gabriel, Raphael

Oct 2nd - Feast of the Guardian Angels

Can you see them? Probably not. They are purported to be pure spirits and therefore supposedly invisible but I know lots of people who at the end of their lives told me they saw them. And I believe it. Can you feel their presence? Sometimes. I feel their presence very strongly today because I pen this note on their Feast day. I will make lots of calls today to all of the Michaels that I know (and that's a whole bunch) and to my own very special angels, my granddaughters, Ange Raphaelle and Ange Gabrielle. My third granddaughter, Ange Michelle is with me as I write. She is my oldest granddaughter who was killed at the age of 8 in a terrible auto accident in 1993. By now, she is a young woman (I have no proof, but I do believe that we continue to grow in heaven) and from her place continues to intercede on behalf of our family. She has become a real angel. And while not an angel per se, she acts like one, a messenger from God.

Angels. Everybody loves angels (except, maybe, the fallen ones). All three major religions of the book have a common father, Abraham and a strong belief In the scriptures, the angels are the in angels. messengers of God. The first thing that comes out of their mouth when they appear is, "Be not afraid" (makes you wonder what they look like, doesn't it?). And then they give their message, "I am Raphael, I will heal your blindness. I am Gabriel, I come to announce you tidings of great joy." Those are the biggies but, like the stars in the sky there are billions and billions of lesser angels and some have been specifically assigned to us as our Guardian Angel. Do you remember the prayer? When was the last time you prayed it? "Oh Angel of God, My Guardian Dear, to whom God's love commits me here. Ever this day be at my side, to light, to guard, to rule and guide. Amen." Do we still teach this to our children? We should. Because the great message of the angels is that we are not alone.

As the primary messengers of the Lord God they come

bearing one particular and profound message: God is with you. We pray in the subjective "The Lord be with you." They proclaim in the imperative, "Be with God for the Lord is with you." Immanuel - God with us. Immanuel, Jesus came 2,000 years ago. He was God with us but he remains by the power of His Holy Spirit and now we become, literally His Body in space and time. How do I know? An angel told me so. And he/she will tell you too but you need to learn how to listen.

One of the tenants of this catholic faith of ours is that we believe in the Communion of the Saints. This means that we are in touch with the spiritual world, those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith and the angels. At every funeral, I announce to the congregation during the incensing of the body that the church is utterly filled not with just the family and those who came to mourn and show their respects but with the saints and angels who are present to help the deceased and all of us on our journey into the heart of God.

And so we celebrate the angels in our lives. They truly are God's message and the message is really Good News.

As part of a year-long celebration of Women in the Church/Bible, the Adult Education and Spirituality Committee is proud to present Sister Barbara Reid, who will discuss Women in the Pauline Churches. THE CHALLENGE OF FORMING CONSCIENCES FOR FAITHFUL CITIZENSHIP (PART 2 OF 6)

This brief document is a summary of the United States bishops' reflection Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship (www.faithfulcitizenship.org). It complements the teaching of bishops in dioceses and states. It is being presented by the MQH Peace and Justice Committee in six parts.

How Does the Church Help Catholics to Address Political and Social Questions?

A Well-Formed Conscience: The Church equips its members to address political questions by helping them develop well-formed consciences. "Conscience is a judgment of reason whereby the human person recognizes the moral quality of a concrete act.... [Every person] is obliged to follow faithfully what he [or she] knows to be just and right" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1778). We Catholics have a lifelong obligation to form our consciences in accord with human reason, enlightened by the teaching of Christ as it comes to us through the Church.

The Virtue of Prudence: The Church also encourages Catholics to develop the virtue of prudence, which enables us "to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1806). Prudence shapes and informs our ability to deliberate over available alternatives, to determine what is most fitting to a specific context, and to act. Prudence must be accompanied by courage which calls us to act. As Catholics seek to advance the common good, we must carefully discern which public policies are morally sound. A good end does not justify an immoral means. At times Catholics may choose different ways to respond to social problems, but we cannot differ on our obligation to protect human life and dignity and help build through moral means a more just and peaceful world.

Doing Good and Avoiding Evil: There are some things we must never do, as individuals or as a society, because they are always incompatible with love of God and neighbor. These intrinsically evil acts must always be rejected and never supported. A preeminent example is the intentional taking of human life through abortion. It is always morally wrong to destroy innocent human beings. A legal system that allows the right to life to be violated on the grounds of choice is fundamentally flawed. Similarly, direct threats to the dignity of human life such as euthanasia, human cloning, and destructive research on human embryos are also intrinsically evil and must be opposed. Other assaults on human life and dignity, such as genocide, torture, racism, and the targeting of noncombatants in acts of terror or war, can never be justified. Disrespect for any human life diminishes respect for all human life. As Catholics we are not single-issue voters. A candidate's position on a single issue is not sufficient to guarantee a voter's support. Yet a candidate's position on a single issue that involves an intrinsic evil, such as support for legal abortion or the promotion of racism, may legitimately lead a voter to disqualify a candidate from receiving support.1 Opposition to intrinsically evil acts also prompts us to recognize our positive duty to contribute to the common good and act in solidarity with those in need. Both opposing evil and doing good are essential. As Pope John Paul II said, "the fact that only the negative commandments oblige always and under all circumstances does not mean that in the moral life prohibitions are more important than the obligation to do good indicated by the positive commandment" (Encyclical Veritatis Splendor, no. 52). The basic right to life implies and is linked to other human rights to the goods that every person needs to live and thrive—including food, shelter, health care, education, and meaningful work. The use of the death penalty, hunger, lack of health care or housing, human trafficking, the human and moral costs of war, and unjust immigration policies are some of the serious moral issues that challenge our consciences and require us to act.
